
My Visit to the Museum of York County




My family will explore the Museum, learn new things, and have FUN.


In front of the Museum, there is a garden with a walking path. Sometimes there will be bees in the garden. The bees help the garden.

When I enter the Museum, my family must register and pay. I may have to wait in line.




Museum staff wear name badges. They are adults I can learn from and can answer my questions, or help me if I become lost.

One exhibit we might visit is *Know Your Nature*. There is a treehouse I can explore and a log I can climb inside. My family will watch me and help me if I need it.





We also might visit the *Piedmont Past* and *Piedmont Present* galleries. The lights in *Piedmont Present* are dim, so I can see animals that are active at night.






In *Piedmont Present*, this is what the part with dim lights looks like. There are so many animals to see!

The Naturalist Center has many animals that are not alive, but that look like they are. They do not move or make noise.





These animals are called taxidermy animals.

That means that they are animal skins made to look as though the animal was alive.

This display shows how taxidermy animals are made.



Outside of the Naturalist Center is a tiger! He is surrounded by bamboo and is behind glass.



In the Naturalist Center are tables with objects I can touch. I can sit in a chair next to each table.









Another exhibit we can see is *Ice Age Carolinas*.

At the top of the sign for the exhibit there is a saber-toothed cat. He will not move. Cats like this do not exist anymore.

In the *Ice Age Carolinas* exhibit there will be many taxidermy animals, and even some skeletons. One of the skeletons is a bear skeleton. It is a very big skeleton. Others are smaller.







There is also a prehistoric ground sloth in this exhibit. It is a model and cannot move. Animals like this do not exist anymore. There are also some big animals that do still exist, like elephants and lions!



Here are some of the other animals. There is an elephant, a cheetah, a lion, and a cougar, as well as some other animals. Seeing animals is so fun!



Tot Town is a fun room with lots to play with.


There may be other children playing in Tot Town,


When visiting the Museum, all the exhibits are UPSTAIRS. I will not climb down the stairs.
