Call to Order

- Penny Sheppard called the meeting to order at 6:00pm
- Penny Sheppard presented the minutes from the meeting and asked for changes or corrections.
 - No corrections to be made, minutes are accepted as written.

Reports and Presentations

- Director's Report
 - *Presented by Richard Campbell*
 - Visitation
 - CHM site-wide visitation for the month of February totaled five thousand, seven hundred and ninety-five. Visitation compared to the previous year is up 16.22%, which is eight hundred and nine in attendance.
 - The year-to-date total is at forty-eight thousand, five hundred and forty. Compared to the previous year, visitation has increased 20.57% or eight thousand, two hundred and eighty-two visitors in attendance.
 - School Groups
 - For the month of February, school group visitation totaled seven hundred and seven. Year-to-date school visitation is at seven thousand, three hundred and eighty-three.
 - Membership

- Membership has increased by one hundred and nineteen memberships with a total revenue of \$9,420. This brings our total year-to-date memberships to nine hundred and twenty-one with a revenue of \$68,135. The CHM overall memberships are at one thousand, four hundred and fifty-five.

 - This annual event took place at the Museum of York County on March 2nd. Six hundred and fifty-nine visitors were in attendance and we received great program feedback via surveys.

Past Events

Harry Potter Science Saturday (MYCO)

- Harry Potter Science Saturday took place on March 2 at the Museum of York County.
- We had 659 visitors in attendance and received positive feedback via survey response.

Reconstruction – Living History Saturday (HB)

- Took place on March 2 at Historic Brattonsville.
- The program highlighted the cultural, social, and political changes in York County during the Reconstruction Era.
- There were 48 visitors in attendance.

York County First Steps Conference for Early Childhood Educators (MYCO & MSCM)

- Occurred on March 16 at Dutchman Creek Middle School.
- MYCO and MSCM's Education Program Managers (Lisa Poff and Allison Faile) worked together to present a session on the importance of nature-based learning for young children.
- There were 23 educators in attendance for their workshop.

Upcoming Events

Living History Saturday: Founding Mothers (HB)

- The final installation of this new Living History Saturday program, Founding Mothers: Work and Play, takes place on Saturday March 30 at 10:00am.
- The program focuses on the lives of women in the Brattonsville community, emphasizing the important and changing roles of women in the development of Brattonsville through the 18th and 19th centuries, highlighting the daily activities of women in different centuries and social classes.

Great Little Growers (MYCO)

- Took place on March 23 at the Museum of York County.
- Young visitors were invited to join us to learn about the importance of gardening.
- Guests had the opportunity to learn about different plants and flowers, and how to care for them.
- Each child had a chance to decorate a plastic flower pot and plant edible flowers.

Miocene Seminar Series (MYCO)

- This 3-class series provides a fascinating look at the natural history of the Carolina Piedmont.
- CHM Curator of Natural History Dr. Steve Fields explores what North America looked like twenty-five million years ago.
- Participants learn how changes in climate altered the landscape and prompted large-scale adaptation, migration, and extinction of lifeforms, over the course of the Miocene Epoch.
- The Miocene Seminar Series began on March 19 and will run through May.

Volunteer Appreciation Events (CHM)

- This year there will be two volunteer appreciation events for CHM volunteers.
- The first will take place at MYCO on April 16 and the second will take place at HB on April 28.
- Volunteers will be able to bring five guests for a site visit, and will provide an opportunity for our volunteers to share what they do for us with their family and friends.
- Special programming is in the works for each event.

- MSCM and HC volunteers will be included in the MYCO event.
- We can't do what we do without our dedicated volunteers and our staff is excited to have this opportunity to express our gratitude and to say thank you.

Museums for All Expansion/York County First Steps Partnership Expansion (CHM)

- We'll be expanding Museums for All in collaboration with York County First Steps' Nurse Family Partnership (NFP).
- NFP offers crucial support to underserved first-time mothers by providing nurses, from early pregnancy through their child's second birthday, fostering significant long-term benefits for the entire family.
- This extension will enable NFP families to visit CHM sites at the Museums for All rate (\$3 per person, up to 4 people).
- Additionally, NFP nurses and families will have complimentary access to MSCM for client visits requiring public space, previously conducted in venues like libraries and parks.
- Holding these visits at MSCM will allow nurses to observe participant children in natural play settings, facilitating assessment of developmental milestones.
- This partnership strengthens our outreach to underserved communities and complements our existing early childhood education collaboration with York County First Steps.
- NFP shared their card design for participant families with Sarah and Olivia for approval.
- Upon NFP's incorporation of requested edits and finalization of the card, a rollout date for the program will be established.

CHM Project Updates

Lowry Family Theatre (McC)

- Midwest Maintenance (MMI) is scheduled to begin work at the McCelvey Center on Monday, March 25.
- Bennett Preservation Engineering, CHM, MMI, and subcontractors met for the pre-construction meeting on March 15.
- CHM issued a Notice to Proceed authorizing work to start on March 25.
- Work must begin no later than April 14.
- CHM staff are completing preparations in the auditorium by removing all sound equipment and other materials from MMI's future work spaces.

Watt Cemetery (HB)

- **GPR Mapping:** John Fisher, Curator of Archaeology at The Charleston Museum, finished Grid 7 of the mapping project and forwarded the data to South Carolina State Archeologist, Dr. Jon Leader for review. Mr. Fisher has conveyed that he intended to have Grid 1 completed by March 22. Once Grid 1 is finished, Mr. Fisher will send the data to Dr. Leader for review before forwarding it to us. After Dr. Leader's review, Mr. Fisher will work with the South Carolina Institute for Archeology and Anthropology (SCIAA) to finalize GPS marking of the remaining probable graves.

- **Security Cameras:** Installation of all of the "Reolink" internet cameras has been completed. There is an issue with one camera array on the property boundary, possibly related to signal or charging problems, and may require the addition of an antenna. Additionally, York County IT is working to ensure that the Reolink application is installed on the appropriate office computers. We are waiting for York County IT to install the final boundary cameras.
- **Fence:** HB Operations has contacted multiple fencing companies to obtain quotes for installing the fence. Two companies have responded, visited the site, and submitted quotes. Unfortunately, there are discrepancies in the quotes regarding materials used, warranty information, and the total linear feet specified by each company. To address this, we have revised the specifications to provide more detailed requirements to ensure consistency in materials and warranties.
- **Grave markers:** The CHM Exhibits department has completed all of the work that can be done with the material that we have on hand. We currently have 320 markers completed. Additional square stock is cut and needs an angle top. We are still waiting on the additional steel.

Fluid Preservation Room (MYCO)

- CHM staff worked with York County Procurement to solicit bids from prospective general contractors to implement the work. Bids were opened on January 30.
- Catalyst Construction, Inc. offered the lowest bid at \$148,335, which includes a 10% contingency as was required in the bid invitation.
- Catalyst is an experienced company that has performed well in previous projects for the CHM.
- Procurement will place the contract on County Council's April 1 agenda.

Col. Bratton House Preservation Project (HB)

- Midwest Maintenance (MMI) and their roofing subcontractors remobilized on March 4 to complete the exterior phase of work.
- The hanging of gutters on the east elevation of the house will be completed once the metal roof is finished at the Homestead House.
- Sara Johnson and preservation volunteers continue to remove the failed skim coat off the circa 1840 plaster.
- Testing of materials for plaster conservation and repair are in progress.
- Wood for repairs and a partition wall has been ordered from Koons Sawmill in Laurens, SC.
- The milled lumber will be stored inside the house to allow it cure and acclimate to the space.

Homestead House Preservation Project (HB)

- Midwest Maintenance (MMI) remobilized on March 4.
- MMI started installation of the surviving and reproduction shutters.
- MMI received the roof metal from manufacturer and delivered it to Brattonville on March 7.
- MMI's roofing subcontractor, completed hands-on training recommended by the manufacturer on March 14 and will soon begin installing the metal roofing panels.
- Replacement of trim at the rake on the gable ends of the Assembly Hall will be completed once the shutter installation is finished by MMI.

Shake Roof Replacement on the Work Barn (HB)

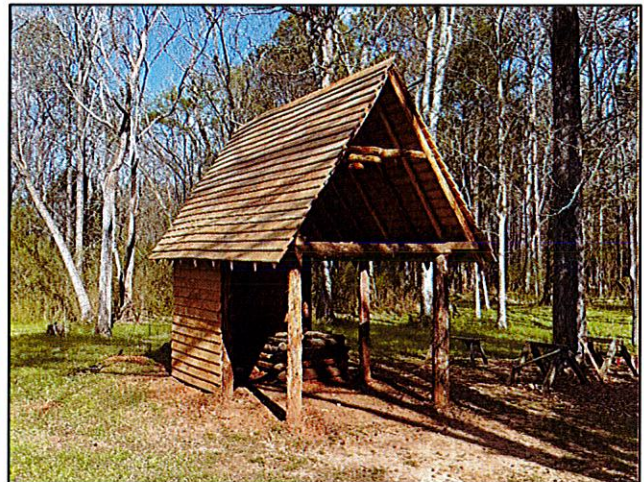
- CHM, working with County Procurement, released an Invitation for Bid on February 23 to replace the shake roof on the Work Barn with the potential to also replace the roofs on the original Outbuilding and Smoke House behind Brick House.
- A pre-bid conference took place on March 14 for potential bidders to view the projects.
- The bidding period closes on March 26.

Blacksmith Forge Shed Replacement (HB)

- Assistant Site Director Joe Mester, Brattonsville Operations, and preservation volunteers set the pine pole rafters and completed hanging the roofing boards on March 18.
- Additional nails will be added to the roof once the roofing boards have cured.
- This work will start after Children’s Day on the Farm (April 20).
- Work to replace damaged logs of the hearth is complete.
- The laying of brick for the hearth is in progress.
- Next steps are to install leg vise, anvil, and bellows.

The donor is and her mother was an active member of the Yorkville Historical Society.

The Yorkville Historical Society was founded in 1978 to “foster and promote historical preservation and restoration in the city of York and its environs”. The information below came from the YHS website <https://yorkvillehs.com/about-us/history-of-the-yorkville-historical-society/formation-of-the-yorkville-historical-society/>

Clyde Oran Smith in October 2007 writes this about YHS’s formation:

I mistakenly assumed that the formation of the Yorkville Historical Society was well known. Recently, however, I read an article in a local newspaper that credited the York Crust Breakers with initiating the society. As a member of this club, Mr. Harold C. Johnson probably did encourage its members to attend and participate in the society. If anyone deserves credit for the society’s formation, it is Mr. Johnson. The society was his idea, and he did most of the work. Mrs. Jane Bratton Spratt and I simply served as co-chairs.

The mayor and city council appointed Mr. Johnson, Mrs. Spratt and I to secure a chairperson for York’s Bicentennial Committee. After an unsuccessful search, Mr. Johnson approached Mrs. Spratt and I and suggested that the three of us serve as co-chairpersons of the Bicentennial Committee. Both the mayor and city council of York approved our appointments.

During our year of service, we helped plan activities in celebration of York’s bicentennial. Mrs. Spratt hosted all of our meetings in her residence. At our final meeting as co-chairpersons, Mr. Johnson proposed the formation of a York historical society. As Mr. Johnson envisioned it, the society would continue long beyond our year as co-chairs. We agreed that this was a great idea.



Persons interested in forming a historical society met at the home of Gladys Montgomery on Kings Mountain Street. All present supported the idea and agreed on the Yorkville Historical Society as the group's official name. Several committees took shape that night, and I served on the bi-laws [sic] committee. At the meeting, Mr. Johnson voiced our mutual desire for a formal record of York's history. We did not, however, discuss the impetus for the society or document its establishment that night. An organizational meeting was scheduled and held in the auditorium of the York Agricultural Building on South Congress Street. Mr. Johnson asked me to preside over the first part of the meeting, until officers could be elected. Mr. Johnson nominated Joey Rainey as our first president. Someone mentioned that the nominations be closed and Mr. Rainey be elected by acclamation. Mr. Rainey became our first president. Although I'm not certain of the other officers, I believe that Nannel Moore served as our first secretary. All present that day signed a tablet of charter members.

After Mrs. Spratt's death in 1980, Rock Hill *Evening Herald* staff member Judy Hoffmeyer wrote an article in which Mr. Johnson is quoted, saying, "We felt if the three of us worked together and each took care of something different, it would work out." Herald photographer Andy Burriss photographed Mr. Johnson and I seated in the gazebo at Moore Park on Kings Mountain Street. The article refers to Mr. Johnson, Mrs. Spratt and I as the organizers of the society. As Ms. Hoffmeyer wrote in her 1987 article, "The three had in mind a society to help preserve historical sites and buildings, to cooperate with the chamber [of commerce] and the city to share the city's history with others." I hope that this brief statement helps clarify the history of the organization for future generations. I was glad to have a small part.

The donor is the daughter of Ela Dixon and Lyndon G. Wilson. The school composition books belonged to the donor's paternal aunt and uncles. This collection of archival materials are a great complement to the previous archival collection donated in 2021 containing ration books, Red Cross sewing patterns, song booklets, and other items belonging to the same family members. The school composition books contain student notes from classes in History, English (1911), French, Poetry (1912), Law, Spelling (1912), and Songs.

An emergency license for teaching for North Carolina is defined as a one-year non-renewable license issued to an individual with a baccalaureate degree with 18 hours of coursework relevant to the requested licensure area, but has not completed a recognized educator preparation program and does not qualify for a residency license. North Carolina State Board of Examiners and Institute Conductors passed the rule August 31, 1918. This temporary measure was to fill teacher shortages during the war.

Ela Dixon (1897 – 1994) was the daughter of John Neely (1862-1929) and Julia Anne Lewis (1866-1940) Dixon. They lived in Gaston County, North Carolina. She was one of 10 listed children.

William Clarence Wilson (1866 – 1944) and Margaret Elizabeth "Bessie" Titman (1888 – 1945) were married in December 15, 1887 in Gaston County. They had 6 children per the census. Lyndon Grier Wilson (1899-1973), Margaret E. Wilson (1902 – 1975), William "Willie" Newton Wilson (1895 - 1968), Fannie Kate Wilson (1893 – 1969). Margaret and William Wilson lived on the land in Gaston County that they farmed for decades. The property was passed down through the family, until finally being given to the donor Lynda Ellen Wilson.

Ela and Lyndon were married on December 15, 1920. They are both buried at the New Hope Presbyterian Church Cemetery in Gastonia, North Carolina. Their child, Lynda Ellen Wilson Hancock, is the donor. She married John Harry Hancock in 1953. They lived and farmed her family land until John's passing in 2020. The donor is going through her family possessions as she starts to downsize in her old age.

The donor's husband, John, was born in New Jersey before moving to Decatur, Georgia. After serving in the US Navy late during WWII, John got his Bachelor of Science in Forestry from the University of Georgia. He worked for Plantation Pipeline for 40 years. He was also an ordained elder and deacon for New Hope Presbyterian Church in Gastonia. He was a member of the NC Society Sons of the American Revolution of a Patriotic ancestor, being a descendent of John Hancock (Declaration of Independence signee).

The donor bought these 4 microfilm reels from the SC State Archives. The Saluda River flows through the Piedmont region. Microfilmed plats contain valuable information for researching property boundaries, deeds, and genealogy. They also help recreate historical communities. The Ninety Six District is important for its role in the Southern Campaigns of the American Revolution and can help document soldiers and their families in that geographical area.

Saluda River:
The Saluda River is a principal tributary of the Congaree River, about 200 mi (320 km) long, in northern and western South Carolina in the United States. Via the Congaree River, it is part of the watershed of the Santee River, which flows to the Atlantic Ocean.

The Saluda River is formed about 10 mi (15 km) northwest of the city of Greenville, on the common boundary of Greenville and Pickens Counties, by the confluence of its north and south forks, each of

which rises in the Blue Ridge Mountains very near the border of North Carolina at Saluda, North Carolina:

- The North Saluda River flows generally south-southwestwardly through northern Greenville County, past Marietta.
- The South Saluda River flows generally southeastwardly on the Greenville-Pickens County border, receiving the Oolenoy River and the Middle Saluda River, which rises in Jones Gap State Park and flows generally southward through northwestern Greenville County.

From this confluence the Saluda River flows generally southeastwardly through the Piedmont region, through or along the boundaries of Pickens, Greenville, Anderson, Abbeville, Laurens, Greenwood, Newberry, Saluda, Lexington and Richland Counties, past the towns of Piedmont, West Pelzer, Pelzer, Ware Shoals and West Columbia. It joins the Broad River in Columbia to form the Congaree River.

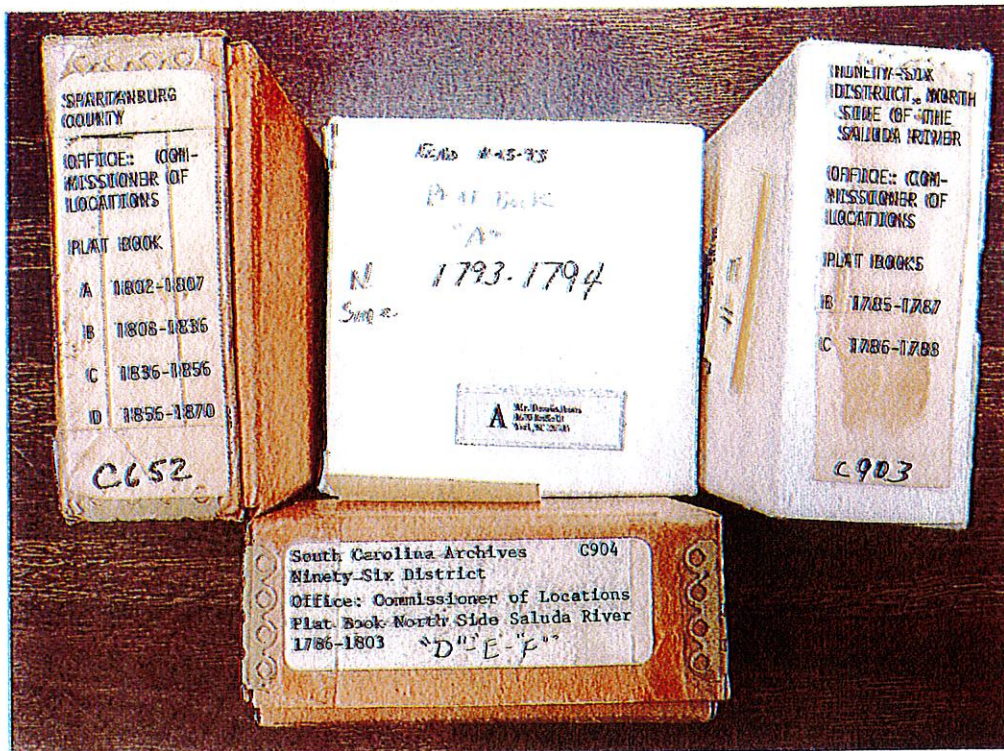

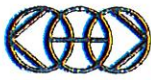

Sharon Women Democrats Get National Attention / New York Women Wish to Bid on Quilt at Picnic
 National attention has been directed to the good work being done by the Women's Roosevelt Club of Sharon, and especially to this organization's resourceful expedient in making a quilt to sell at auction as a step toward raising funds for the Democratic campaign.

Mrs. James D. Gist (Susie H.), president of the club, is in receipt of a telegram from Mrs. James H.



Wolfe, executive of the Democratic National Committee, New York, women's division in which she inquires how much is wanted for the quilt, stating that she and her associates wish to bid on it.

The quilt is a work of art, made with the skilled needlecraft for which Sharon women are noted. The colors - quite appropriately - are red, white and blue. This quilt has evoked the unstinted admiration of all who has examined it.

Some speculation has been heard in York and elsewhere as to who will be the owner of the quilt after it is sold at auction at the big picnic to be held at Sharon August 12 and what the price will be. With York County Democrats enthusiastically supporting President Roosevelt for re-election, and with party fervor expected to run high at the picnic, it is a safe bet that the quilt will bring a fancy price.

The auction will be cried by Robert M. Whitesides (Uncle Bob to his intimate friends), veteran county auctioneer, who may be depended upon to do his utmost to see that the quilt is well sold.

In addition to the candidates for county offices, Congressman J. P. Richards will attend the picnic and deliver an address.

The *Evening Herald* carried an article dated Sharon-August 12 (1936) adding information about the sale of the "Roosevelt Quilt" at the political rally - S. B. Pratt, Jr. bought the quilt for \$150 at the action cried by Bob Whitesides, auctioneer. Mrs. Herbert Bayard Swope of New York telegraphed a bid of \$100.
